Project Milk: What it Means, and How You Can Help! Since 1984, Project Milk has shipped over 500 tons of powdered milk to Casa Hogar orphanage in Lima, Peru. So, what has this meant for the children there, and for the surrounding poor of the community? Casa Hogar goes through two-and-a-half 50 lb. bags of whole powdered milk weekly. For breakfast, each of the orphanage's 'households' shares a gallon of a nourishing mixture of milk, quinoa, wheat, oatmeal, and chocolate. Every school lunch includes milk. And milk is added to the bread baked fresh every night, along with many desserts, including milkshakes, rice pudding, ice cream, and cakes. In recent years we have been sending whole powdered milk, which is creamier and better-tasting than nonfat. More importantly, the children come to Casa Hogar deficient in many vitamins, especially calcium, and this milk provides much-needed nutrients. Of the 800 bags of powdered milk sent to Lima in each shipment, 194 go to Casa Hogar, 200 to the 17 orphanages in the Lurin area, 200 to the Diocese of Lurin, 150 to Sagrada Familia Orphanage with its 500 children, and 40 to Santa Rosa, a community devastated by flooding in 2023. This leaves six bags for emergency use. As you can see, it's not just Casa Hogar that benefits from this milk... it's the whole region around Lima, Peru, and they all thank

Lent: A Time for a Change of Heart. "Even now, says the Lord, return to me with your whole heart"; for I am "gracious and merciful." (Joel 2:12; Exodus 34:6) We want to prayerfully seek the strength of the Holy Spirit so He will lead us in purification which is a process of grace working within us. Actual grace comes from prayer and doing acts of kindness. We receive sanctifying grace, which is God's own divine life, in the Sacraments. This process requires our cooperation and a change of heart, which involves the whole interiority of the person. Let us pray and ask the Holy Spirit to "Create in me a clean heart" as a new way to respond to those around us. (Psalm 51: 10) God gives us the strength and power to change our sinful attitudes and behaviors. So, the process of daily conversion, and sometimes of the hour or minute, involves God supplying what we need and our responding to His love through cooperating with His grace. This is a gradual process and takes effort. A good place to begin is by taking quiet time to be with Jesus, to rest in Him and reflect upon His Word in the Bible.

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14th. Lenten regulations are as follows:

- 1. Catholics who have celebrated their 14th birthday are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent, and Good Friday.
- 2. In addition to abstaining from meat, Catholics who have celebrated their 18th birthday, until they celebrate their 59th birthday, are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Those who are bound to this regulation may eat only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

From the desk of the DRE

Are you living in the light?

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus is speaking with the Pharisee Nicodemus, who comes to him at night, perhaps waiting for the cover of darkness because he is timid about approaching this extraordinary itinerant rabbi who is beginning to cause a stir and is becoming a "person of interest" to the religious leaders of the day...but not in a good way.

In his diatribe with Nicodemus, Jesus seizes on the opportunity of his coming at night, and tells him, "everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God." Is Jesus simply chastising Nicodemus for his timidity? Perhaps, but his words have a much wider application, too. Even today, when we turn away from God and toward sin, we tend to do so under the cover of darkness. "Nothing good happens after midnight," as the saying goes. It's as if somehow we are attempting to hide our actions from God...much like our first parents in the Garden of Eden. Those who, as Jesus put it, "live the truth," however, have no need to shroud their actions.

But if we add to our considerations what Jesus tells his disciples in the story of the man born blind from John 9—when he says, "While I am in the world, I am the light of the world,"—we see that Jesus' sharp words to Nicodemus are not merely rebuke, but an invitation: he invites Nicodemus to recognize that, in coming to Jesus, even if in celestial darkness, he has come to the light.

Jesus as the light of the world is another big theme in the Fourth Gospel. John even introduces his Gospel with the words, "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world." But light that comes into light is undetectable. Turn on a flashlight in the noonday sun, and you will not notice its effect. But Jesus, the light that was coming into the world, came into darkness, as he, himself recognized: the true and utter darkness was also present and potent in the world, and light and darkness were headed for a showdown. "Night is coming," Jesus tells his disciples. Fast forward to the cross. The darkness deals what it

Fast forward to the cross. The darkness deals what it thinks is the deathblow to the light when, at noon, darkness came over the whole land...until three in the afternoon. And as the light of the world gives a loud cry and breathes his last, night floods the cosmos and the light is extinguished. ...Or is it? Or perhaps the gathered gloom which enshrouded all existence was allowed to gather so that the dawn might burst forth upon it, vanquishing the darkness forever.

So now, the invitation is not just for Nicodemus, but for all of us (this time, from John's first letter): "walk in the light as he is in the light."
